

³⁵But someone will ask, "How are the dead raised? With what kind of body do they come?" ³⁶Fool! What you sow does not come to life unless it dies. ³⁷And as for what you sow, you do not sow the body that is to be, but a bare seed, perhaps of wheat or of some other grain. 38But God gives it a body as he has chosen, and to each kind of seed its own body.42So it is with the resurrection of the dead. What is sown is perishable, what is raised is imperishable. ⁴³It is sown in dishonor, it is raised in glory. It is sown in weakness, it is raised in power. 44It is sown a physical body, it is raised a spiritual body. If there is a physical body, there is also a spiritual body. ⁴⁵Thus it is written, "The first man, Adam, became a living being"; the last Adam became a life-giving spirit. ⁴⁶But it is not the spiritual that is first, but the physical, and then the spiritual. ⁴⁷The first man was from the earth, a man of dust; the second man is from heaven. 48 As was the man of dust, so are those who are of the dust; and as is the man of heaven, so are those who are of heaven. ⁴⁹Just as we have borne the image of the man of dust, we will also bear the image of the man of heaven. ⁵⁰What I am saying, brothers and sisters, is this: flesh and blood cannot inherit the kingdom of God, nor does the perishable inherit the imperishable.

Lenten Series: Celebrating the Disciplines

"Superficiality is the curse of our age," says Richard Foster, author of *Celebrating the Disciplines*, which is the basis for our Lenten study this year. Foster notes that, "The doctrine of instant gratification is a spiritual problem," but "the classical spiritual disciplines of the spiritual life call us to move beyond surface living into the depths." Spiritual discipline, however, is not "dull drudgery," but rather is characterized by joy because, by placing ourselves before God, the disciplines allow transformation of the inner spirit.

Concurrent with our Lenten disciplines outlined in the invitation to a holy Lent on page 265 in the *Book of Common Prayer* (self-examination, repentance, prayer, fasting, self-denial, and reading and meditating on God's holy Word), **beginning on Wednesday, March 12, and continuing on Wednesdays through April 9, we will gather for a simple meal beginning at 5:30 pm with program from 6:00 to 7:00 PM.**

PORT volunteers needed

St. Andrew's will be partnering with New Beech Grove Baptist Church on Tuesday evening, March 25, through Wednesday morning, March 26, for our final PORT commitment this season. PORT is a program that provides meals and overnight accommodation at host churches for the homeless in our community. Our volunteers will be feeding and hosting the overnight guests at the site location (361 Beechmont Drive, Newport News). Volunteers will greet the guests, help store their personal bags, help with the clothing closet, and hand out bedding. The number of guests has grown this season to 130 adults. Consequently, the Cook Team is asking for the parish's assistance with preparing one-half of the casseroles needed. We will provide the recipe, a casserole baking pan, and reimbursement. The St. Andrew's Cook Team will prepare the remaining half. Morning volunteers will assist in handing out bagged breakfasts, returning personal belongings and taking in bedding.
